

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

ast month I made much of the I fact that KHS is extending its outreach beyond the lecture hall. I am pleased to report that we have

been invited to participate in a proposal being developed by architect, Tony Barlow, and leading community activist, Helen Finley, with the assistance of KEDCO and Kingston Cultural Initiatives (KCI): the Kingston Heritage & Design Resource Centre.

The central premise is that Kingston is a "Special Place" because of its remarkable collection of its distinctive assemblage of architecture, a remarkably intact downtown core, and a unique identity. The point is made that the recent growth of tourism is a signal demonstration of these attractions. Equally important, permanent residents value their lived-in place for the aesthetics of the city fabric and the rich quality of life.

While much of this may be attributed to energetic actions by several forward-looking individuals and agencies such as LACAC, much remains to be done. The KH&DRC is intended to raise Kingston's public awareness of the city's built heritage and ambience and the need to

continually be on the qui vive to prevent its erosion through ignorance and neglect.

To this end, the proposed KH&DRC will be located downtown as a place for education, information, problem solving, and entertainment and will be a meeting place for professionals, volunteer groups, and local societies. In this way, the KH&DRC would: *sustain an awareness of Kingston's architectural treasures *nurture a pride in our built heritage and sense of place *serve as design and construction resource for property owners and developers alike *provide an attractive setting for a semi-permanent exhibition exploring and interpreting evolution of architectural and urban form in Kingston ★ house a record of Kingston's built heritage * develop a reference library of historical, architectural and technical material *present a visual display of 'do's and 'don'ts' of restoration, infill and building, in this architecturally significant historic city * develop a relevant and current web site. How could KHS not be interested in allying with such a worthwhile endeavour?



DARWIN'S KINGSTON RESEARCH ASSOCIATE, **GEORGE JOHN ROMANES:** BUT WHO WAS THE KINGSTON LADY?

wo prominent intellectuals, Grant Allen and George John Romanes, were born in Kingston in 1848 and had much in

common. Both were sons of Queen's College professors, both were interested in biology, both spent most of their lives in England where they went to major universities: Allen Oxford, Romanes to Cambridge. A difference was that Allen had

to make his living by writing, whereas Romanes was wealthy. Thus, Allen mainly wrote novels, whereas Romanes wrote scientific papers and books and, in 1874, became Darwin's research associate.

In his twenties, Romanes and his elder brother had been taken in by a spiritualist and there was some disparaging correspondence with Darwin.

Darwin was well aware that there were major inconsistencies in his 1859 theory of the origin of species by natural selection, which had been independently conceived by Alfred Wallace. Prior to his death in 1882, Darwin probably spent more time discussing these


inconsistencies with Romanes than anyone else. In 1886, Romanes presented a theory of the origin of species by "physiological selection" to the Linnean Society. He claimed to have resolved the inconsistencies, but invoked abstract elements (e.g. "a peculiarity of the reproductive system"), which were incomprehensible to his Victorian contemporaries. He was strongly attacked by the elder statesmen of science - including Wallace.

In his twenties, Romanes and his elder brother had been taken in by a spiritualist and there was some disparaging correspondence with Darwin. Later Romanes was critical of Wallace's advocacy of spiritualism. Romanes' brother sent the correspondence to a Kingston friend. This lady showed it to Wallace when he visited Kingston on a lecture tour in 1887. Wallace later used the material to attack Romanes, who died of a brain tumour in 1894. Recent genome project research has led to a new reinterpretation of Darwin's theory suggesting Romanes' "physiological selection" was correct. (Prepared by Donald Forsdyke)





THE LINES HOUSE 1785 - 1988

did my first drawing of the Lines House in August 1985 (above). It was located on Ontario Street at the foot of Earl Street. It was built by Nathaniel Lines, an Englishman, who worked as an official of the colonial government in Kingston serving as an interpreter for native people. The house was mentioned in 1785, making it the oldest house in Ontario. The house later served as a tavern. a boarding house, and as a private dwelling.

As a child in the mid 1940s, I lived on the corner of King and Earl Streets. I remember that a small black lady with curly white hair and her handsome son lived there. The neighbours, when

talking among themselves, all called her 'Snowball,' but she was always Mrs Chapman to me. Her son operated the elevator in Steacy's Department Store. My friends and I liked them. They always smiled at us and gave us a treat on Halloween.

I felt that it was important to do this drawing of the Lines House because a developer had bought it and was going to put up condominiums. A group, headed by Margaret Angus and the Frontenac Historic Foundation, had the house moved to the foot of North Street. Another \$50,000 provincial grant was supposed to come for renovation. The new tenant, 'Information Kingston,' was slated to move in on 1 April 1988. However no one in the ministry would commit themselves.

I did a second drawing of the house after it was moved to its new isolated location (below left). It was boarded up for security but already it had been reported that "street-people" had been living there. Then, on 2 April 1988, just before midnight, a taxi driver detected the fire. It was too late to save the Lines House. It had been arson! Word spread and a real sadness hung over Kingston, especially for all those who had worked so hard to save it!

Again, I went down to draw the Lines House as it looked after the fire (below right). It was all so tragic and a very unhappy ending for sure! I decided I would try to remember it as it was in my first drawing and in my mind's eye as a child!

September, Harvey Medland presented the first address of KHS's fallwinter program: "The Antarctic Adventures of Kingston's Tom MacLeod." It was an outstanding success and some 100 members and friends of KHS were engrossed by the exploits, shenanigans, and bravery of Thomas "Mac" McLeod. With the aid of slides from the Antarctic expeditions, our speaker developed a colourful account of Mac's adventures with his 37 years at sea, his role in the Shackleton expedition, and his last 37 years as a resident of Kingston. Following an excellent question period, the Society enjoyed refreshments and discussion of the evening's presentation.

The presentation of 15 October at 7:30PM will also address how a Kingstonian gained fame outside of Canada and his association with a notable historical figure. Dr Donald Roy Forsdyke of Queen's University will be speaking on John George Romanes, a Kingstonian, and his involvement with Charles Darwin and his Theory of Evolution, a summary of which is provided on page 5 of this month's Limelight.

On 19 November, Dr Lubomyr Luciuk of the Royal Military College will speak about the role of Fort Henry as an internment facility for aliens and other prisoners of war during two wars.
