

Rather than a mere critique, it presented an alternative that recognised other Queen's developments (Goodes Hall), the importance of the threatened architectural stock, the possible use of renovated existing structures, and the availability of land on the West Campus. etters of enquiry from beyond continue to prompt us to dig into our local history. Thus, a J. Th. J. Krijff, of the Netherlands asked KHS if we could locate information about the visit by Duke Bernard Saksen-Weimar-Eisenach and A.E. Tromp in 1825. A brief report was, indeed, found in the *Kingston Chronicle* of Friday, 2 September 1825:

On Sunday evening last, arrived in town in the Frontenac from Niagara, His Serene Highness the Duke of Saxe Weimar. The Duke was received with a Royal Salute by the garrison, and proceeded to the lower province on Monday morning on board the Dalhousie. He returns to the United States via Lake Champlain, and will, it is said, spend the ensuing winter in the Southern States. His Serene Highness is married to a sister of the Duchess of Clarence, and is represented as remarkably courteous and agreeable in his deportment. He was in service of the King of Saxony at the battle of Wagram, in 1809; and held a distinguished rank at the battle of Waterloo – that being his 5<sup>th</sup> campaign.

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In a future *Limelight*, we'll report on an enquiry by Ralph H. Hunter of The Longboat Key Historical Society, Florida, regarding one, Colonel George Hunter of Kingston.

## GEORGE LILLEY

1918 - 2003



ANY OF TODAY'S KHS MEMBERS not remember George Edwin Osborne Lilley. George had not been at all well in recent years and gave up his annual trips to town to act as photographer for the 6 June Macdonald memorial service. For those who knew him, George is remembered with great affection. He left behind him a legacy of good friends and a collection of photographs that will live long after him as a wonderful record of Kingston in the last half of the 20th century.

George was very much a Kingstonian. He often enjoyed telling stories of his father taking him to see the firemen drill their horses at the old Brock Street fire hall, or of a time when he was something of a musical prodigy and gave organ recitals at St. George's Cathedral. He knew and remembered so much about a Kingston that is now past.

During WWII, George served in the Royal Canadian Air Force and, after the war, he worked at the National Film Board of Canada. He had been interested in photography from an early age and, after leaving the NFB, he became a freelance photographer in Kingston. His work included news photography, insurance work, documentaries. advertising, and promotional work. During those years, he was under contract to the Kingston Whig-Standard, Toronto Telegram, and the Globe and Mail, as well as to news services and a number of foreign and domestic journals. He also served as public information officer with the Canadian armed services and, at the end of his career, was a Public Affairs Officer with the Canadian Coast Guard, stationed in Toronto.

Photography was not only a profession for George Lilley, it was an addiction. His topics were varied and various. While he specialized in news pictures and what he called 'scenics,' there are also portraits in his collection. At one time, a CBC documentary crew complained that it could not find a decent portrait of Senator Rupert Davies, Robertson Davies's father. That was no problem for George Lilley. He was a convivial fellow and a

favourite of the Senator and, in the course of his many visits with the Senator, he had taken several very good portraits of the gentleman.

George took pictures of Kingston and its people throughout his career. There are tens of thousands of images in his photographic collection, and the vast majority of these are about Kingston and Kingston happenings. Since much of his work in the late-1940s to the 1970s was for the Kingston Whig-Standard, there are many photographs of news events in the area. The collection includes pictures of local beverage rooms, members of the Royal Family, Santa Claus parades, murder-scenes, deer that somehow strayed into a Princess Street store, new equipment for the city, and photographs taken of various phases of the construction of now prominent local buildings. Not all of George's efforts were expended on commercial work. He knew and loved the city so well that he often took pictures of vanishing landmarks for his own satisfaction. One series depicts the demise of a row of lovely stone store-fronts that once occupied what is now the S & R parking lot on Princess Street.

In 1980, George began to turn over his wonderful collection of photographs to Queen's University Archives. In 1999, QUA was able to find funding to index the collection online. Today, George's legacy to Kingstonians is available, with very few restrictions, for all to enjoy.

George is survived by his much-loved wife, Jean (McBrien).



PART ONE: THE KINGSTON GRAIN ELEVATOR


t was October, 1986 when I started painting the Kingston Grain Elevator as part of my "Waterfront Series." By this date, so much of Kingston's mercantile heritage was disappearing as wharves were replaced by hotels, condominiums, and marinas. Opened in 1930, the 2.5 million-bushel capacity grain-elevator was also destined to go soon. It had served the Canadian Steamship Lines lakers and canallers for over fifty years when I decided to add it to my collection.

I first painted the Mapleheath that was tied-up on the east side of the elevator. But I knew I would need to get permission to get to the vessels on the west side. This was going to be a problem. Someone had started a fire that caused \$5,000-worth of damage on the Nipigon Bay that was alongside the Metis

and T.R. McLagan. The Canadian Steamship Lines had posted a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of the culprit and had hired extra men to guard the ships. To add to the problem, a young man had committed suicide there, leaving a car with a note saying, "Thanks for the car. The keys are in my pocket."

Nevertheless, I eventually got permission from the guards to enter the property and I painted three paintings outside, including this view.

But the towering structure of the Elevator also intrigued me with its flaking paint and broken windows. I longed to get inside and explore it and, hopefully, paint it. Of course, I eventually did so and that will be the subject of next month's tale!
