

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



here was a good run of days in the last week of October for regional historians. Midway between celebrating the 30th anniversary of service

for the Wolfe Islander III and the 150th anniversary of the first arrival of steam train locomotives in Kingston on 27 October 1856, was an illustrated lecture given to the Pittsburgh Historical Society by Joe Calnan. Joe is a trained and active professional boat builder who took on the task of exploring the first four vessels built on the Great Lakes by the French in the 17th century. His close examination of contracts in the Quebec Archives and of a rare illustrated work located in France revealed to all of us, who listened in wonder, new ideas about the origins of Kingston. Earlier in the week, aboard the Wolfe Islander the Minister of Transport, officials and guests listened

consulted Captain Brian P. Johnson about the history of the ferry service. It was a perfect blustery day aboard a vessel that has given 30 years of reliable service. On Friday, Via Rail toasted 150 years of the Quebec City-Windsor Corridor with much credit for organizing the event going to well known bon vivant, Brian Osborne. The Town Crier, costumed ladies and rail enthusiasts whooped it up in the hustle of a very busy station. In the background and much honoured was rail historian, Bill Thomson, Joe Calnan, Brian P. Johnson and Bill Thomson have a characteristic in common—a deep knowledge of their subject informed by their life experience. It was a good week for Kingston history in all respects.

History is alive and well in Kingston, and also in our neighbouring communities. Consider some of the activities that took place this summer.

SYDENHAM

Who says there's no such thing as a free lunch? Ginny Trousdale and Wilma Kenny, with support from local businesses, the Frontenac Community Futures Development Corporation, and the Eastern Ontario Development Fund, have

SHARBOT LAKE & PARHAM

For over a year, Central Frontenac Councillor, Janet Gutowski, chair of the Economic Development Committee has been actively promoting a series of "historical murals" in Sharbot Lake, Parham, Mountain Grove, Arden, and Picadilly. They are intended to enhance life in these communities by beautifying, building pride, and stimulating the economy by attracting tourists. The first one, "The Final Journey," was unveiled on 13 May in Sharbot Lake. This 4 x 8 meter mural depicts the passing of Sir John A. Macdonald's funeral train through the village in June of 1891. The

second was unveiled on 25 August during the 14th Parham Fair and depicted the 50 persons at the 1950 Fair. Six prints (Tichborne on the left) by John DuChene of all

the proposed murals have been produced and are available through Janet Gutowski at 613-375-8814.

YARKER

On 7 October, the Yarker History Project unveiled a wall-sculpture overlooking the beautiful Yarker waterfalls. Financed by the Ontario Arts Council's Artist in the Community Program and the Yarker Community Association, the History Project commemorates the village's rich industrial past. Part of

the original land grant awarded to Governor James Simcoe, Yarker was long a centre of lumbering and possessed many mills and industries. The most famous is the Benjamin Hub and Spoke Factory. This plaque is the first of a series intended to highlight the community's outstanding natural and historical attributes.


The KHS 4th ANNUAL AUTUMN EXCURSION

Following a delightful luncheon buffet at the Partridge Berry Inn, we quenched our thirst at the 1801 Burrville Cider Mill situated beside a 10 m. high rushing waterfall.


The afternoon began at the Sackets Harbour battlefield with an informative, humorous and







the history of the United States.



It was as good as it gets! by Shirley Gibson-Langille




t started out to be just an ordinary day that 5th of June 2003 when I took off to Leeds and the Thousand Islands. I was in search of something of interest to paint. I found myself exploring the village of Lansdowne. There, on a back street, Centre at Cliff Street, I made an amazing discovery—the old stone J.W. Lackie & Sons Feed Mill Warehouse. It was just as if I had traveled back in time.

Needless to say, I was excited and inspired to get started. How I enjoyed drawing the building—along with all the different birds feeding there. At noon, after I had finished my peanut butter and radish sandwich, I decided to walk around this fascinating building with its interesting stonework. When I got to the south side of the building, I made an astounding discovery. If you think Christopher Columbus was excited when he discovered America, you should have seen me! On the wall was an oval cement sign reading, "Braehead School 1872."

Later, I found out the history of the school from a 1994 Front of Leeds and Lansdowne Historical Society Newsletter. It appears that, in 1826, Lansdowne was granted a common school called McKelvey School. Originally a log building, as the community grew and developed, about 1860, it was replaced by a brick school on the east side of Railway Street. It was also used as a place of worship. Then as the local population continued to grow, a larger school, Braehead, was built of stone in 1872.

At the March 2005 meeting of the Leeds and Thousand Islands Historical Society, I learned from Eric Webster, a lifetime resident of Lansdowne, that he owned the bell from Braehead School. It had been passed down to him by his grandfather.

Nothing could top that wonderful red letter day on a back Street in Lansdowne! It was as good as it gets!

n 19 October Patricia Phenix, the author of Private Demons, The Tragic Personal Life of John A. Macdonald, addressed some 70 members of the Society and guests. She organized her presentation around key incidents in John A. Macdonald's life that she considers crucial in conditioning the mood and mode of the

inner man. These included his assumption of a responsibility to support the family from a tender age, an obligation occasioned by his father's feckless nature and alcoholic habits. Given his success in this, John A. was lionized by the women in his family, whose adoration created difficulties for Isabella, his first wife, whom he referred to as "the invisible woman". Then there was the searing experience of witnessing, at age seven, the brutal death of his younger brother, James, who was beaten senseless by a drunken

child-minder—a friend of their father. That crime was never reported. The presentation was followed by a question period, refreshments and opportunity to purchase an autographed copy of the book from Oscar Malan of Novel Idea .
