

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

he very first article to Historic appear in Kingston was by the late R.A. Preston in 1952. Since then the transactions of the KHS have appeared regularly. For over 50

years, the editors have kept before them a high standard of historical truth.

Perhaps in Canada and, shall I say Kingston as well, we are a little more fortunate than most nations, in that we do not readily buy into a 'nationalist' agenda that requires a high order of mythology to sustain it. Does one of our national characteristics — an unwillingness to lay on too much boosterism — bring us closer to an historical truth or are we like many, using a national

mythology as a kind of blinker to avoid other stories? One circumstance is certain. We cannot escape the lens of the culture we live in.

It's a complex world where it is difficult to marry the physical world of action with that of written policies and institutional agendas that are generally found in archival collections. Historians are sometimes like Scrooge who attributed the ghosts he saw before him, the consequence of ill digested cheese while others soar with insight, the result of a life earnestly lived. The only tools we really have to do the job are a fit mind and the historical method that brings us as close as we can get to an historical truth. Each issue of Historic Kingston moves us closer to understanding where Maurice Smith we live.



#### RICHARD ARTHUR PRESTON

Society and especially his former students and colleagues regret the death, in early November, of Richard Preston, a respected and generous friend. During his residency in Kingston, Dick was an ardent supporter of the Society and served as its Secretary. He was the first editor of *Historic Kingston*, laying the firm foundation upon which it continues to flourish. In 1994, Dick received a KHS Award in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the study and recording of local history.

Dick was born in Middlesborough, England and studied at the University of Leeds. He received his Ph.D. degree from Yale in 1936. Following wartime service with the Royal Air Force, he immigrated to Canada and joined the staff of the University of Toronto. The Preston family came to Kingston in 1948 when Dick was appointed Professor of History at the newly reopened Royal Military College of Canada.

He immediately became engrossed in the study of Kingston's military heritage. Two of his books, *Royal Fort Frontenac* (with Leo Lamontagne) and *Kingston before 1812*, both published by The Champlain Society, have become classic reference works. His two-volume history of RMC provides a sound study of that important Kingston and Canadian institution, which he served faithfully for

seventeen years. A fifth book published during his Kingston years, *Men in Arms* (with S.F. Wise et al), is still in print fifty years after its initial publication. The combination of history and sport, he was a strong swimmer and water polo player, stimulated Dick to investigate the hulks of 1812 warships that lie scuttled in Kingston waters. The reports of his findings are regarded as pioneering works of local marine archeology.

In 1965 Dick was appointed the W. K. Boyd Professor of History in the British Commonwealth Studies Program at Duke University in Durham, North Carolina where he enjoyed a distinguished and productive career. He established the Centre for Canadian Studies at Duke and was the first President of the Association of Canadian Studies in the United States. However, he and his family maintained close links with their Kingston friends and for many years summered at their cottage near Gananoque.

Dick's wife, Marjorie, well remembered for her activity with Kingston theatre groups, passed away in October of this year. A daughter, Carol, predeceased them. Our sincere condolences go out to their surviving sons, David and Peter, and to their families.

We think the concept has worked well. As



He remarked upon a number of Kingston's citizens and managed to become part of town life. His travels took him all over Lake Ontario and Lake Erie via portions of the first Welland Canal. Bob Andrews is annotating the journal, prior to its publication by KHS.
