

THE SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD DINNER AT RMC ON 11 JANUARY (photos pp. 4 – 5)

hile offering up the nose of Sir John A. Macdonald for examination at a feast to celebrate his birth did not quite match the sensation that surrounded the circulation of John the Baptist's head on an earlier occasion, it did represent a departure from the presentations of previous years. By and large the speaker, Dr. Vivian Nelles, Wilson Professor of Canadian History at McMaster University, managed to combine "a light-hearted approach" to his subject with some serious research on the relationship among physiognomy, caricature as art and commentary, and the nature of Canadian politics in the last half of the 19th century.

Professor Nelles illustrated his address with three or four of the very few (perhaps no more than a dozen) photographs taken of John A during the golden age the camera, and a large number of Bengough cartoons, drawn in a curious combination of obvious condemnation and covert admiration by one of John A's strictest moral critics. This entertaining and illuminating lecture concluded another in the KHS's very successful series of dinners in honour of Sir John A. Macdonald's birthday. The address will be published in a future edition of *Historic Kingston*.

PARKER'S JOURNAL REVEALED AT THE 17 JANUARY MEETING

othing stirs an historian's blood quite like the discovery of a diary. When, in addition, the author has an enthusiasm for the life he has chosen, observes the passing scene with a penetrating eye, and presents his findings with dash and conviction, as well as commendable


frankness, we are truly blessed. At our regular January meeting the chairman of our publications committee, **Bob Andrews**, presented "A Troublesome Berth, A Journal of Service in the Canadas, 1838-1840, by 1st Lieutenant Charles Allan Parker, Royal Marines". He explained the provenance of the journal, revealing the reasons why young Parker maintained the journal in the first place, and how the

document came into the Society's purview. Then, in a series of excerpts from the journal, illustrated by glorious historical and contempo-

rary illustrations drawn from a variety of sources, he discussed Parker's youth and domiciles, his enlistment and decision to depart for the Canadas, the voyage, his arrival at Quebec and the opportunity to see service at Kingston. There followed, in quick succession, a description of

his adventures occasioned by the "Patriot" Panic and incursion at Prescott, following the Rebellions in the Canadas (including mad dashes into darkest republican territory at Sackets Harbor), service on Lake Erie (including a description of the first Welland Canal), and a passage along the raw and recently completed Rideau Canal. Throughout the journal Parker describes and assesses Kingston events, issues

and personalities. After Bob has finished editing and annotating the journal, it will be published by the Society.

hree splendid publications relating to the Kingston region have been published recently. One is about a local county, another about a neighbouring city, and a third focuses on a local bioregion.

The Heritage Atlas of Hastings County (Wallbridge House Publishing: 2006) is edited by the former journalist and well-known writer of local histories, Orland French. This study challenges the traditional definition of "atlas." Yes, there are lots of maps (239 in all!) that help those "looking for old gold mines, railway stations, cheese factories, colourful rocks or your greatgranddad's grave." These are supported by some 34 informative essays on such topics as ecology, exploration, settlement, and social

historical and contemporary images. Milly Ristvedt has edited a superb natural and

development and accompanied by a panoply of

history, cultural Salmon River Watershed: Jewel of Eastern Ontario (Tamworth: 2006). Produced by the Friends of the Salmon River, this lavishly illustrated study array presents an ecological, historical, and social analyses and closes with a novel collection of artistic reflections on this

distinctive part of eastern Ontario. This is a model study for those wishing to further explore the symbiosis of humans and "essential environment."


The most recent addition to the growing collection of community portraits is Glenn


T. Lockwood's The Story of Brockville: Men and Women Making a Canadian Community on the United States Frontier, 1749-2007 (Henderson Printing, Brockville: 2006). At over 660 pages, this is doorstop of book! But its very size allows it to effect a detailed chronological interpretation of the community's 1749-2007 history in 22 chapters organized in seven sections. Replete with maps, paintings,


and photographs, people and their stories are to the fore as Lockwood presents his story of how

Brockville emerged such as "identifiable community" over two centuries.


