





#### MANY HANDSOME RESIDENCES.

Probably the handsomest residence in the city this year is that of James A. Hendry, the wholesale grocer. It is on the corner of King and West streets and will cost about \$12,000. Donald Fraser has also built a pretty house on King street at a cost of \$5.000, and Joseph Upper is remodelling his place at a cost of \$4,000. On George street, near the general hospital, W. Newlands, jr., has erected a spacious mansion. It cannot have cost less than \$6,000, and his father, G. Newlands, sr., has flanked his house on Princess street with another one on the north side of a very imposing design. Its cost will be in the neighbourhood of \$3,000.

No part of the city shows greater improvement than that lined by Gordon street. It is certainly the spot for the snuggest of residences, and is rapidly filling up. Among the newest buildings are those of William Elliott costing ......, F. Davis, two brick dwellings worth \$1,200 a piece; John McCartney and A. Gallinger, fine brick houses.

On Brock street also many improvements have taken place. Valuable brick houses have been built by S. Chapman, A.W. Stevenson and R. Cluxton, a terrace of three; James Connors, two, and Samuel Jenkins, two. All these are estimated to have cost from \$1,200 to \$1,800 each. Phoebe Taylor has built two brick and roughcast dwellings which merit special note for their tasty appearance.

Crossing over to the upper end of Johnson street we found many evidences of prosperity. Squalid tenements have given place to attractive homes of frame costing from \$600 to \$1,000 each. The owners are: William Gates, J. W. Crowley, T. Rutherford, R. Dickenson, P. Haffner, James Fowler, James Godwin and John Rutherford. James Boyd and R. Filtz have erected brick dwellings on the same street.

#### HOMES IN VICTORIA WARD

In Victoria ward the new buildings were numerous. John McArthur has a neat frame house on David street; and Edwin Charles has added another on Division street. Theo. Allan and Abram Hoppins have nice residences on Herchemer street, while James Allen, Edward Burke and Alfred Simmonds have helped to fill up the spaces purchased by them on Livingston avenue with elegant frame buildings, and R. Sergant and W.S. Gordon have in turn added to the appearance of Frontenac street. All these houses have not cost less than \$1,000 each.

Crossing into Rideau ward a person is surprised at the change that has taken place. We found many frame buildings, not already indicated, and located

as follows; C. H. Powell, Division street; John Calback and James Calback, two handsome residences of street; Thomas Coyle, Neslon street; Albert street; J.B. Youreux, Alfred street; 3,000 residence on Princess street well. S. Lee, Frontenac street, V. Marshall, Albert street, have each be to \$1,500 each.






