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

GLANMORE HOUSE IN BELLEVILLE

Quite the most beautiful and elaborate Victorian house in Belleville is the 1883 Glanmore at 257 Bridge Street East. Formerly the Hastings County Museum, it has become the property of the city of Belleville and with that has come a name change to Glanmore National Historic Site. It continues its mandate to collect, preserve, exhibit and interpret objects from the Belleville region, as well as furnishings and accessories which relate to the house itself.

Restoration of the building has cost \$340,000, half from the federal government under its National Cost Share Program, available only to National Historic Sites. Many other donors included the Salaman Estate Bequest.

Much of the leadership in the project has come from Rona Rustige, who is Curator/Manager of Glanmore, and once Curator of our Murney Tower Museum. We extend our best wishes to her and to the continued success of Glanmore. For more information, you can call Rona at (613) 962-2329.
