

THE STORY OF THE KINGSTON

For our April meeting, we are delighted to welcome back Rick Neilson who will present the colourful story of the 1854 steamer Kingston which served the Prince of Wales on his visit to Upper and Lower Canada in 1860 and is now a dive site.

Rick is a ten-year member of our Society and a Life Member of the Marine Museum of the Great Lakes at Kingston. He has been a certified diver since 1971 and has written articles on marine history in Freshwater and Diver magazines and a talk about black businessman George Mink to our Society last February.

The meeting is at 7:30 pm, Wed.15 April in the Wilson Room, Kingston Frontenac Public Library, 130 Johnson Street, downtown. Guests are always warmly welcomed, and there are refreshments to enjoy.

HOUSE HISTORY HUNTING

An excellent guide is the little book 'The Complete House Detective' written by Donalda Badone, published by the Boston Mills Press in 1988. It is the story of the author's search for the history of her own home in Willowdale, well illustrated with maps, posters, documents and sources of historical information in Ontario. She also provides a chart of types and varieties of early Ontario homes with photographic examples, her research methods and a bibliography.

We regret the passing of a long time member of the Kingston Historical Society, Kathryn Billings. We wish her well on her journey beyond.

HELP SAVE THE DIEU

In 1841, the Religious Hospitallers of Saint Joseph of Notre Dame Convent in Montreal sent Sister Amable Bourbonnière to Kingston to establish a boarding school for the Catholic education of young girls. With the help of four more nuns, they settled in two empty houses at 231 and 233 Brock Street in 1845. Their duties as teachers was to be expanded rapidly to provide care for the sick, orphans and destitute women.

Thousands of poor and sick Irish immigrants, fleeing the potato famine at home, flooded through Kingston on their way west, bringing an epidemic of cholera and typhus. By 1847, more than 1500 died in what was then a city of 8000.

Over the 153 years since they began their benevolent work in Kingston, the Sisters of Hotel Dieu built an institution and expanded medical services that are respected far beyond Kingston. Large sums have been invested in modernization over the past twenty years, \$5.6 million in just the last year and a half.

How inexpressively sad, then, that our provincial government has seen fit to close the hospital, discharge or scatter its dedicated staff and tear a hole in the lively fabric of downtown Kingston. We all need to help. Please write letters, sign petitions or send a cheque before 14 April to:
