## **OUR CHRISTMAS PARTY**



## **OUR SOCIETY AWARDS**

It is always a delight to see that worthy, hard-working individuals receive recognition for their efforts. This year, our Society presented its annual Awards to Brig-Gen Bill Patterson, Donald Redmond and Carol White.

Bill's career has embraced the military, superintendant of historic sites for the St,Lawrence Parks Commission, an author of six historic books, active leadership in both the Kingston and Pittsburgh Historical Societies and much more.

Donald Redmond has edited our annual Historic Kingston for twelve years, served on our executive committee and has presented entertaining dramatic readings at our meetings.

Carol White has served the Kingston school system for thirty-one years, sharing her enthusiasm for history with her students and taking a leadership role in the planning of five successive Kingston Regional Heritage Fairs. In their capable hands, our Award recipients ensure that, despite educational tinkering, Canadian history is not dead.

## **OBITUARIES**

It is with great sadness that we learned of the death on 30 October 1998 of Donald Swainson, Professor of History at Queen's and a Life Member of our Society.
