### UNITING AND DIVIDING

For our April meeting, we welcome our own member, Rev. Bruce Cossar, who will speak of Uniting and Dividing: Church Union in Kingston 1925. Why did three Christian denominations in Canada decide to combine into one United Church? What happened to the twelve congregations as a result?

Rev. Cossar is an Arts '60 graduate from Queens, with Library Science degrees from McGill and Toronto. After two years in the Massey Library at RMC, he helped found Trent University Library and was eventually its Chief Librarian. After studying theology at Knox College in Toronto, he was ordained as a a minister of the Presbyterian Church and served for 12 years in the Stirling/West Huntingdon parish north of Belleville from which he retired and came back to Kingston in 1997.

### SAVING THE COURTHOUSE

On March 9, City Council met to decide upon the disposition of the former Frontenac County Courthouse, unwanted by the city. Eleven delegations of lawyers and historians presented eleven spirited and logical cases for preserving it as a courthouse, using arguments dating back to Queen Victoria's day. Our own presentation was effectively made by Dr. Brian Osborne. Council decided to delay its decision until the matter was presented for public discussion.

### WHY AN INTERNET WEB SITE

John Grodzinski of our Internet Web Site Sub-Committee has submitted a significant overview of the possibilities and implications of the Internet for our Society. They are repeated here for your consideration:

AIM: The aim of an Internet site is to communicate the goals of the organization operating it. Examples; Ontario Genealogical Society Many civilian and military museums Fort Henry Guard Toronto Historical Board Military Re-enactors Heritage enthusiasts

TYPICAL CONTENT:

Aims and purposes of organization
List of officers
Overview of subject area covered
Articles and information published
Electronic copies of excerpts of
publications
Information for ordering publications
Applications for membership

value: The value of a site is the information it offers beyond a simple description. Successful sites offer visitors text, photos, maps, charts tables and especially prompt response to enquiries. The site must be updated regularly to provide new material. All sites should provide links to other related local, regional and national organizations.

**CO-OPERATION:** Most sites are independent. If there is an association with others, they become members of a ring linking them. Being part of a

larger site has merit but requires more management and may make specific information less accessible to visitors.

Other local historical/heritage groups **ESTABLISHMENT COSTS:** 

Internet web sites are provided through commercial providers that charge a fee for the number of megabytes used. For example, some providers offer one megabyte of space free with a suscription and an additional 5 megabytes at a rate of \$20 per month.

Domain name is the address by which the website can be located. A specific domain name can be obtained for a fee.

### MAINTENANCE OF SITE:

First, the building and editing of material in computer language for the site. This can be done by the agen cy which operates it or. more cheaply, by our members.

Second, an individual is needed to regularly monitor queries, get answers and forward them to the person making the enquiry.

FUNDING: Sources of funding may include:

The Kingston Historical Society through its own operating budget.
Grants can be obtained to cover

all or part of cost.

Commercial sponsorship can be solicited in exchange for logo and information on the sponsor.

## **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

These have been approved by the Executive Council of our Society:

1. That KHS establish a website.

2. That this site initially be independent; examining expanding it to include other heritage organizations.

3. That funding support be obtained

through grants.

4. That it include the material under the heading 'CONTENT FOR KHS SITE' listed above.
