ABOUT OUR MEMBERS

We learn with regret of the passing of life member Audrey L. Richardson Kirk, U.E. of Frankford after a lengthy illness. Mrs. Kirk was an active and dedicated United Empire Loyalist. Our sympathies are extended to her husband and family.

New member David Warren, late of the Kingston Whig Standard, has rejoined The Idler as Editor-in-

Chief, directing the literary magazine he founded in 1985. Incidentally, his trusty word processor and voluminous library occupy the historic spot which, two years ago, was architectural ruin, rubble and early Kingston artifacts.

PRESIDENT FRANK MILLEDGE

Frank Milledge was born in England and emigrated to Montreal with his parents in 1929. In the thirties he worked in a stockbroker's office on St. James Street and he was a photographer with the Cunard White Star Line when the war broke out.

He joined the Canadian Army in 1940 through Loyola College Contingent COTC as an infantry officer and transferred to the armoured corps in 1942. He joined the Sherbrooke Fusilier Regiment in action in Normandy in August 1944 in time for the Battle of Falaise, and campaigned in France, Belgium, Holland and Germany. He was with the Sherbrookes when the Regiment returned to Canada in January 1946.

In 1946 he joined The Royal Canadian Dragoons and wore its badge in various staff appointments and United Nations postings until his retirement in 1969. While with the UN, Frank saw service in Lebanon, India, Pakistan and Kashmir. When he retired he was the Chief Administrative Officer at the Army Staff College at Fort Frontenac.

In 1968 he became the Executive Director of our local United Way and he retired from that post in 1986 after being involved in eighteen annual campaigns. He is currently Chairman of Kingston and District United Way Endowment Fund, an organization which he helped to establish. It seeks bequests and gifts to meet the capital needs of United Way agencies.

Frank is a Past President of The Rotary Club of Kingston (1973-74) and was Chairman of the Board of Kingston Regional Hospital Laundry (1979-1983). He was a charter member of the Camp Borden Curling Club, which was formed shortly after the war, and a charter member (1961), and later president, of the Kingston Garrison Curling Club.

With his son Christopher, he is co-owner of the sailing-yacht Samoena, a 29 ft. Bayfield berthed at Loyalist Cove in Bath. He has two sons, four daughters and seven grandchildren.

For forty-nine years Frank was married to Moira Fredrickson who died on December 28th last, a victim of Alzheimer's disease. Moira was a gracious and outgoing lady whom many members will recall with affection.

Hobbies apart from his family, sailing and curling, include travelling and making his computer justify its existence - as in keeping the books of this Society. While interested in history, he does not claim to be a history buff even though he has made several visits to United States Civil War battlefields with fellow Rotarians. In September he was in Holland revisiting some of his wartime haunts. He next hopes to revisit Normandy, perhaps in 1993.

MARINE MUSEUM

Despite winter, the Marine Museum of the Great Lakes at Kingston (MMOTGLAK?) is open seven days a week, 10 am to 4 pm until Sunday 23 February to celebrate our heritage. Besides its treasure trove of marine artifacts, charts, models and paintings, it presents a special exhibition of native artifacts on loan from the Tyendenaga Reserve, and early French artifacts from Fort Frontenac. The latter were uncovered by the Cataraqui Archaeological Research Centre during its dig at the

fort. A video will accompany the display, as will Wally Breck's model of the 1738 fort.

MURNEY TOWER MUSEUM

Wingston Historical Modern H

Our Society has operated the 1846 Murney Tower as a museum since 1925. Parks Canada maintains the building against age, frost and moisture. During the 1991 season, attendance was 5880, generating \$9553.95 in admission fees and \$528. in gift sales. Museum operations were funded by the City of Kingston (\$1000), the Provincial Ministry of Culture and Communications (\$3390.), and the Kingston Historical Society (\$2471.), as well as SEED and EXP grants to defray staffing costs. Society volunteers are needed, come Spring, to greet visitors, seil gifts, record artifacts and plan murders. If interested, call Beverley Lazier.

NEW REGIMENTAL MUSEUM

The Princess of Wales' Own Regiment reports that its Regimental Museum is now open in the Montreal Street Armoury, Monday and Thursday at 7 to 9 pm. It showcases the history of Kingstonians who 'answered the call' from the 1855 Militia Act to the Gulf War. Seven small companies of volunteer county militiamen became the 14th Battalion Militia Rifles of Canada on 16 January 1863. This became the Princess of Wales' Own after the marriage of Princess Alexandra of Denmark to Edward, Prince of Wales, later King Edward VII. The regiment has served in the Fenian Raids, the Riel Rebellion, the Boer War, World Wars I and II, the Korean War and today's Canadian Forces. The PWOR has the task of defence and security for the First Divisional Headquarters in Kingston, a first for a Militia unit. The museum was opened by Princess Diana during the recent Royal Visit. SIR JOHN A'S BOOK


