Welcome to the team, Melina!

Hello everyone! My name is Melina and I am so excited to be a member of the Murney Tower team for the next month where I will be completing my alternative practicum. I am a Consecutive Education student at Queen's University and will be graduating with qualifications in the primary/junior divisions. I am originally from Toronto, and completed my Bachelor of Arts at Ryerson University in Early Childhood Studies. I have been in Kingston for a short time, but I've really loved every minute that I've been here - even though my entire teachers education program has been entirely virtual up until this point! The Murney Tower team is currently working with the Queen's Engineering course APSC 100: Module 3 on two projects designed to improve the quality of our exhibits. For the first project, engineering students are working to create an interactive model of our Blomefield cannon that demonstrates how the weapon worked. Our hope is that this model will make the display more engaging for young audiences. The second team of students is assessing the caponiers that are located in the Tower's basement to assess options for making the rifle ports into climate-controlled exhibit areas, which would allow more flexibility for future exhibit designs.

In March, representatives from each of these teams visited the Tower to explore their respective areas and take photos and measurements. We captured this great image of the caponier team and their project manager, Leah Claire Bourque, on their visit. We are so excited about these projects and can't wait to see the finished products!
