



Kingston Historical Society Awards for 2013

ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE OF CANADA MUSEUM

The benefit of setting up a College museum was recognized as early as 1879. However, the thought did not become reality until 1921 when Major General Sir Archibald C. Macdonell, the then President of the Kingston Historical Society and RMC Commandant, established a museum in the Fort Frederick Martello Tower. It has continued in that location and is the oldest museum in Kingston. During the past ninety years, its collections have grown steadily and today constitute a highly significant assemblage of artifacts relating to the College, its graduates, the 1812 Royal Dockyard and, more generally, to Canadian military history. The widely acclaimed Douglas Arms Collection is of particular note. Additionally, staff members of the Museum have provided vigorous support and leadership to both local and national museum communities. Very recently, the Museum has developed a walking tour of Point

Frederick, with associated interpretive panels, that presents an understanding of the role of this important 1812 site. The Kingston Historical Society is pleased to recognize the many contributions of the RMC Museum to the preservation and interpretation of our local history.

CANADA'S PENITENTIARY MUSEUM

Founded in 1967, Canada's Penitentiary Museum has become an award winning heritage institution, drawing some 25,000 visitors annually. Since its move in 1985 to its present location, Cedarhedge, the former warden's residence built by convict labour in the early 1870s, it has expanded to offer eight exhibition rooms, while its significant, growing collection provides a research centre for scholars of Canadian penal history. During the


past thirty years, the museum has been under the wise guidance of its curator, David St. Onge, whose dedication has brought the museum award-winning success. In this he was supported by the enthusiastic volunteers of the Friends of the Penitentiary Museum (founded 1998). Together they have vigorously fulfilled the museum's mandate to? preserve and interpret the past and contemporary experience of the people and places associated with the history of corrections in Canada? The Kingston Historical Society is pleased to recognize Canada's Penitentiary Museum for its important regional and national presence interpreting the complex history of the Canadian penal system and providing a successful focus for heritage tourism.

Turks Used Furniture and Antiques 1901-2013

I painted this painting of Turks at 281 Princess Street from my car across the street on May 28th, 2012. It is a very unique looking building from the outside. Stepping inside Turks is like going way back in time with its original tin walls, ceilings and creaky wooden floors. It has always been full of antiques and all sorts of weird and wonderful items such as paintings, records, tapes books along with many other treasures.

I remember visiting this store first with my mother, who bought a lovely rocking chair from the 2nd floor. In later years, I enjoyed popping in looking for local history books. I always enjoyed looking at the paintings that lined the walls going upstairs. I was always expecting to see one of mine there.

They were friendly and always allowed me to put up my posters in their window. It was there that Alex Ross who was the editor of the Entertainment Section of the Whig Standard saw the Poster of my" Frontenac Islands Show" and gave it magnificent coverage.

In March 2013, I was very sad to hear that after 111 years in business, Turks would be closing. It was then I decided to do the painting of the inside as well.

I found out the business was started in 1902 by Jacob Turk and has been in the family since. Jeff Intrator is the fourth generation as his mother was a Turk. The first store was at 399 Princess Street. They moved to their present location in 1920.

Jack Baker who has enjoyed working there for 22 years said he is sad to see it end, however It was time as antiques are not in Vogue anymore and the younger people are not interested in them. Jeff said he will be missing the hustle and bustle of Downtown but mostly the people who have been so wonderful and supportive.

It is Saturday, June 1st 2013, their last day of business and some of those people have been coming in to say how very much they will be missing coming there. Sadly it's an end of a era! One I will never forget!




Simpkins Sewing Machines 1863-2013

I can't believe that I never noticed the Simpkins Sewing Machine Store. It was likely because I was never interested in sewing. I can't even sew a button on properly! It wasn't until 2013 when I parked in front of the store at 181 Sydenham Street and noticed a large sign in the window reading 150th Anniversary, that I decided to come back and do a painting of the store.

When I finished the painting, I went inside the store. It had many different sewing machines, colourful spools of threads, gadgets along with some beautiful items that had been made on the machines. What really excited me however, was all the historical memorabilia and photos of the past on the walls.

I met the owner Eric Simkins. He preceded to tell me a fascinating story of how his grandfather Miles Wesley Simkins in 1862 at the age of 19 left the farm to seek fame and fortune. He saw a Toronto ad in the British Whig seeking a salesman in the Kingston area. With only \$4.50 in his pocket, and enough education to read and write his own name, he took the chance. He rode in the "hold" in the ship to Toronto as freight for \$1.50. He got the job



and received a hand operated sewing machine for demonstrations. His convincing sales pitch soon made him known as "The Great Sewing Machine Man". He opened a sewing machine store at 9 Montreal Street in 1866 and later expanded to 366 Princess Street. He also opened a successful business in Newburg in 1875.

Wesley died at age 93 in 1936. His three sons continued selling and repairing sewing machines until 1957 when all three brothers split up and went their separate ways. Vernon, the second son, opened the first egg grading business in Kingston, but still repaired sewing machines at home. He sold that business and bought the two story building at 181 Sydenham Street that he operated until his death in 1979.

Eric his son "Mr. Sewing Machine Man" now conducts a positive business like his Grandfather in the computerized machines of the second millennium.

I later came back to do the drawing of the inside of the store.

I certainly learned about the captivating history of the sewing machine business but I still know nothing about how to sew.

Oh well maybe in another lifetime?! ha
