John Grenville, respected Kingston historian and former historic site superintendent, presents an overview of his intensive research into a building at 450 Princess Street that has intrigued him for many years.






### MEMBERSHIP NEWS



# THE PLEASURES of HISTORICAL ONTARIO TRAVEL DESTINATIONS

KHS members Alison and Peter Ginn had a special opportunity to travel to the Chatham/Kent/London area last year to attend the *Battle* of the Thames commemoration (1813) and to enjoy a gala ball to celebrate two centuries of peace.

Such interactive events are gaining popularity here in Ontario, especially with many anniversaries of key historic events happening during the next five years.

The battle re-enactment event included public visits to the large military camp site, British Army drill practices, talks by Tecumseh, music by a fife and drum corps, horse riding demonstrations, and an impressive artillery display. Merchants were situated on the periphery of the camps and battle-field.

Regency era dance classes were held in preparation for the evening's *Ball at the Forkes*. Over 250 people were seated for the splendid dinner and historical entertainment, which included colourfully festive native aboriginal performances in ceremonial regalia.

The enticing autumn supper menu was representative of the era, including cornbread, butternut squash soup, Cornish hens, root vegetables and a traditional bread pudding with a liqueur and blueberry reduction. A commemorative wine had been created by Wilson Estate Wines. Table service was conducted with grand precision, much to everyone's pleasure.

The dancing proved to be very popular: many were enthusiastic about trying out their newly learned steps and formations.




TIME TO THINK ABOUT SUMMER AND HISTORY, a special blend of enjoyment?

One of the useful tools in determining the building date of, and changes to, a heritage building is studying relevant photographs. Generally speaking, there was no reason to alter early images and so "what you see is what you get" – in fact, occasionally, it can be a shock to find aspects you had not thought existed.

Queen's University Archives has a large collection of regional images and one can begin the search at home by consulting http://archives.queensu.ca (click on databases), but asking for help in person from their staff at Kathleen Ryan Hall may be necessary. Also, there are few images displayed on the archives website and, consequently, you need to go there to actually view those that sound promising. Obtaining images from a previous owner or a descendant of a person once connected with the property can be even more helpful.

Photographs in seemingly poor condition may be improved by scanning and working with the digital results for enhancing contrast and lighting. Try to scan at a high resolution (minimally 600 dpi), so that you can view details enlarged on the computer screen. Behind those persons posing stiffly in the foreground of family portraits may be glimpses of buildings relevant to your project. It is rare to find buildings – unless they are landmark ones — as the main subject matter before the mid 1870s.

Dating an undated photograph brings up its own set of problems. The type of photograph and the clothing of sitters can sometimes help. Although not specifically written for architectural history purposes, Jennifer McKendry's new book, *Early Photography in Kingston from the Daguerreotype to the Postcard*, contains dating and technical information and some images not previously published.

Images showing the changing face of 1 Baiden Street, built in 1860 in Portsmouth Village by John and Mary Pugh, aided in its restoration. An Irish emigrant, John was a cordwainer who taught shoe-making at the penitentiary. The house – which survived a lightning strike in 1878 -- passed in 1889 to his son Thomas, a guard, but he defaulted on the mortgage in 1901 and it went out of the Pugh family's ownership.

EVAN MacCOLL—KINGSTON'S GAELIC POET 1808 -1898 by George F. G. Stanley

"The Conservatives won the General Election of 1878. But Sir John, for the one time in his career, was beaten in his home town of Kingston. It was only a narrow victory for Alex Gunn, but it was sufficient. Defeat struck deep into Macdonald's pride.

Macdonald never forgave MacColl. It was widely believed that the poem printed in the Whig the day before the election turned voter sentiment to favour Gunn."

Men of Kingston, Celt or Saxon Now's the time for honest action, Lo, the high point of corruption Once more seeking your seduction. Every patriot looketh on you, Ready to cry out, well done you; Up then, sternly, swear it, shout it — John A.'s people must be routed; Well their hearts may quail and quiver Men of Kingston, now or never.

Printed anonymously in 1878 in the Kingston Whig in support of Liberal Alexander Gunn. Macdonald lost.

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
