
President's Letter Kingston Historical Society April 2015

March 18th Meeting

Adrian Halpert spoke on how the railway came to Kingston. At first this new project was seen as an improvement which would help Kingston's staggering economy and a number of prominent citizens were individually and as a group working to bring the railway here. But reality prevailed. The railway was not built from Collins Bay along the waterfront and through the downtown, either because of the difficult land conditions, or because land speculation made it uneconomical. Instead the line went inland and Kingston Junction was built several miles north of downtown - and the city boundaries were extended so that the Grand Trunk could claim to 'serve Kingston'. Various other schemes failed including the Wolfe Island Canal and the train ferry to Cape Vincent, both of which were to open up the lucrative American market. Instead, Kingstonians who wished to travel or to move goods had to use the branch line to start their travels. Or, as many did, staved with on the water with the old dependable shipping companies. Yet again, Kingston's hopes for becoming a commercial metropolis faltered.

Congratulations to Bill Fitzell for his victory in the Great Canadian Flag Debate. You will remember that on February 20th, Bill and Bob Harper, Chair of the Brockville '50 Years of our Flag' committee, debated which city had bragging rights as the originating city for our flag. MP Ted Hsu had not appreciated driving past the Brockville sign claiming 'Birthplace of the Canadian Flag'. The debate was inconclusive, with both cities feeling that they had proved their point. But now we know that Bill was the outright winner: Brockville has taken down its sign! Perhaps it is time to follow up on an idea that emerged during the debate: that Highways 401 and 416 should become 'Gateways to the Cities who envisioned the Canadian flag' – or perhaps 'The Matheson-Stanley Freeway'. Just a thought!
