Speaker Robert C. Engen

Weathering the Storm: Health Protection and the Canadian Corps during the Pandemic of 1918.

Robert C. Engen PhD, is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Defence Studies at the Canadian Forces College in Toronto, but has lived in Kingston for two decades. He is the author of three books on human behaviour in war, co-author of a forthcoming graphic history of the Battle of Hill 70 in 1917, and is the author of a book on disease prevention during the Second World War, soon to be published. He was lead researcher for the Hill 70 Memorial Project and is writing the next volume of the official PPCLI regimental history. His talk is based upon research carried out for the Canadian Armed Forces' Surgeon-General and was presented to a senior medical advisory committee in April 2020 at the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic, and was thereafter published in the Journal of Military, Veterans, and Family Health.

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President's Message

We recently reached out to Jennifer Campbell, the director of heritage services for the City of Kingston, to inquire about the status of the SJAM statue and plans for its relocation. Her reply has been edited for space:



"The Sir John A. Macdonald History and Legacy Working Group continues to meet monthly, though the work since September has

moved into a phase of writing and editing. The working group has established small 1 -2 person teams, each of which has taken a theme [such as] ... Macdonald's early life in Kingston, Indigenous Peoples in Kingston, the Indian Act and Immigration. ... The working group has also reached out to Bellevue House and is looking forward to future alignment and intersection with the work underway to present Macdonald's history and legacy at the National Historic Site."

Regarding the location of SJAM's statue, Dr. Campbell notes that "we are now processing the feedback received through the recent open surveys and Indigenous-led talking circles that were held through October and November. These community engagement opportunities focused on collecting thoughts and input on 1) the proposed relocation of the statue to Cataraqui Cemetery and 2) ideas for future installations at the statue's former location in City Park.

... Staff are now assessing what was submitted and will be presenting a report to Council on the feedback and proposed next steps in early February 2022."

HOW A BOX OF OLD LETTERS LED TO WRITING A BOOK by Bill Patterson

In the summer of 2002, while preparing to write the history of the Princess of Wales' Own Regiment (PWOR), I made a search of the unit museum looking for historical material. I found an old cardboard box hidden under a display cabinet. When I opened it I found a number of military medals on top of a bunch of old letters, still in their original envelopes. The medals belonged to a Lt F.E. Wootton, Canadian Field Artillery, and the letters were sent by him during the First World War to an address in Winnipeg. There was no connection to the PWOR, so I took the box to RMC thinking that an MA student might be interested.


After my book on the history of the PWOR came out in 2004, I thought of the box of letters. I found that no one at RMC was interested in its contents so it had been placed in Queen's Archives, which holds archival material found in Kingston. As I was now engaged in writing another book on military history, I again put the thought of investigating the contents of the box on hold. Two books later, plus a minor stroke, I finally found the time to open the box in 2014.

What I found was a treasure-trove of priceless historical material: 146 letters written during the First World War by a student of engineering at the University of Manitoba, who joined the Canadian Field Artillery (CFA) on November 11, 1914, being recruited in Winnipeg for the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF). Francis Edward Wootton (FEW), 29 years old, 6 foot 4 inches tall, was a CPR conductor of 10 years standing, who had left regular employment in 1912 to further his education. While attending Wesley College and the University of Manitoba, he roomed and boarded with the Sharman family of two adult boys and four girls at 535 Bannatyne Ave, Winnipeg — the address to which all the letters were addressed.

To be able to work with the letters, I paid a Queen's student to open all the envelopes, spread out all their contents, and copy them, digitally and chronologically, into yearly groupings: 1915 - 21 letters; 1916 - 35; 1917 - 43; 1918 - 35; 1919 - 12; total 146. Then, I enlisted my good friend Sandy Campbell as editor. First she went through all 146 letters, inserted punctuation, and generally tidied up the letters to make them easier to read. Then she went through my planned layout of a book to tell the story of FEW's life, in other words, a biography. His life was much more than five years of military service, 1914-1919: he served in the Canadian Militia between the wars, and in the Canadian Army (Active) for six years during the Second World War. When not soldiering, FEW worked for the CPR for 47 years, rising from the rank of a day labourer through conductor to divisional superintendent.

All my previous nine books were written for organizations which acted as the publisher. Since I had no experience of soliciting a commercial publisher, I decided to publish the book on FEW on my own, using a local printer, Allan Graphics Ltd. It prints *Historic Kingston*, an annual publication of the Kingston Historical Society, a standard 6 x 9 paperback in black and white with a full colour cover (now in full colour, ed.). I decided to use the same format.

Taking Sandy's advice, I entitled the book "Wootton's Wars." It consists of the usual preliminary material: Short Title page, Title page, Dedication, Foreword (written by my good friend, MGen Frank Norman), List of Illustrations and Maps (41 in total), Preface and Acknowledgements . Then an Introduction is followed by 15 Chapters, and a Conclusion. Next listed are numerous sources of information. Primary: in addition to the 146 letters, FEW brought home 26 examples of First World War memorabilia; Library and Archives Canada has FEW's complete military history, amounting to 83 pages: and a number of Census Reports. Secondary: 15 First and Second World War histories. Then follows a Glossary and List of Military Units connected to FEW.



When you read the story of his life and look at his only legacy — the 13 medals as shown on the back cover, and on display at the Canadi-

an Military Engineers Museum at the Canadian Forces School of Military Engineering, CFB Gagetown, NB, you will realize what a true patriot he was, and that he should be recognized and remembered. Hopefully, this book will be his memorial.

Edward Francis Wootton's father was stationed in Fort Frontenac as a British Army sergeant, and his son was the last Commandant of the Canadian Army Staff College at Fort Frontenac. After

retirement, he became a Justice of the Peace in Kingston and a member of the KHS Executive before his death in 2000.


Past President Warren Everett writes:

A Slow and Steady Beginning for the Leeds and 1000 Islands Historical Society

On a balmy spring evening in 1991, a small group of people sat around a table on the patio of the Golden Apple in Gananoque. We were hosted by Shirley Fernetich who had a passionate interest in the history of our area. Attendees at that meeting included Bill Boulton, who became our first President, Alan Lindsay a historical researcher and genealogist, Shirley Fernetich our host, Mary Joan Barrett, Alexis Girling and Bruce Kibble who owned an antique store in Lansdowne and myself, the current President of the group. Over the next few months, more meetings were held in various locations in Lansdowne and area.

Conversations revolved around the need to preserve our heritage: oral, written and built. One of the catalysts for this meeting was the tearing down of the McNeil barn which local legend says was the oldest barn in Ontario still standing at that time. According to Ernest G. Cook who did an article for the Watertown Daily Times in 1940, it was erected by a passing platoon of soldiers during The War of 1812. (See Fall/Winter 2012 Newsletter).



In 1992, the first official meeting of the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne Historical Society was held at the Community Building in Lansdowne. At that meeting most of the Executive Offices were filled and we were started!

By 1994, we were incorporated under the Ontario Historical Society and published our first newsletter! Five programmes of historical interest were presented and the membership rose to over 60 people. Our display at the Lansdowne Fair brought much interest and membership grew. Lisa Thompson was hired through a government program to help with sorting and cataloguing items which had already been donated to the society. Hilary Ann Hamilton, our second employee also started recording oral histories of local residents.

Amalgamation of the Townships of Front of Leeds and Lansdowne, Rear of Leeds and Lansdowne and Escott Township brought a new name and new focus. We became the Leeds and 1000 Islands Historical Society.

Over the past 27 years the Leeds and 1000 Islands Historical Society has been involved in many projects. Some of these include the designation of Darlingside (a historic home and business on the St. Lawrence River under the National Historic Sites of Canada which does not provide protection for buildings), the restoration of Greenfield School (S.S. #3), the restoration of the Railway Mural at the train tracks in Lansdowne in cooperation with Lansdowne Association For Revitalization, and the research, production and erection of several historical plaques in the Township of Leeds and the 1000 Islands.



We have also heavily supported the development of the Veteran's Memorial in front of Thousand Islands Elementary School . We have given financial support to the Rockport Customs Park, which consists of the old custom house and dock on the St. Lawrence River in Rockport, and the archaeological dig at Lyndhurst where the first iron smelter in Upper Canada was located.

Most importantly, the Leeds and 1000 Islands Historical Society was a partner in forming the Leeds and 1000 Islands Archives. We remain a signatory to the Memorandum of Understanding with the Township of Leeds and 1000 Islands and the LTI Public Library, and provide the volunteer hours to operate the Archives.



Currently, we have approxi-

mately 140 members and are working with the Friends of Springfield House Complex to conserve Springfield House and the former Escott Town Hall as a heritage centre for the township.

Covid 19 has caused the Society to pause many of our activities, but the organization is hoping to resume public meetings and fund raising in the spring of 2022.
