## Bellevue House: Old house, new experiences

With Bellevue House reopening on May 18, Parks Canada is sharing the story of the house's renewal in a series of articles for Limelight.

Mark your calendar! At 10:30 a.m., Saturday, May 18, you are invited to the official reopening ceremony for Bellevue House. Free entry is being offered for the day.

In addition to being able to explore all the changes to the house, visitors will also be able to hear from some of the people who have contributed to how the story of Macdonald is shared with the public. The support and input from local Kingston Indigenous community members, surrounding Indigenous Nations, racialized voices, tourism stakeholders, historians, and other experts, have enabled Parks Canada to create a more complete and engaging way to tell the stories and history of Macdonald. These stories have allowed for the creation of unique visitor opportunities; a whole new suite of regular programming options will be available this summer.

Self-guided tours enable guests to experience Bellevue House National Historic Site at their own pace. Visitors are encouraged to download the Parks Canada mobile App and the Bellevue House self-guided tour content to enhance their experience with additional information than what is provided by the exhibit panels.

Participating in a guided tour is a great way to enhance a visit to Bellevue House, engage with staff and other visitors, and join the conversation about Macdonald's place in history. Several new guided tours are available for individuals/families and for larger groups and schools.

Bellevue, in brief does just what it says; it provides an introductory experience for visitors to Bellevue House, helping them uncover connections between the picturesque Italianate villa and what it symbolized in the life of Sir John A. Macdonald. This 20-to-30-minute tour will be offered daily in July



and August, in English at 11:15 a.m. and 3:15 p.m.; and in French at 10:15 a.m. and 2:15 p.m.

Keeping up appearances is a guided experience that delves into how class segregation was an inherent part of life in the 1840s. Participants will learn what it was like to live in a time when social status literally defined what doors you could open. Challenge yourself to understand what life would have been like if you had been a woman, a maid-of-all-work or an upper-

class gentleman. The tour is 2 to 2.5 hours long and will be offered in July and August. Those interested in participating are encouraged to call 613-545-8666 or email believue.house@pc.gc.ca to reserve a spot for July and August or to book a private group tour for September and October.

*Unpacking Macdonald* is a guided tour that gets into more detail about Macdonald, the lifelong politician who had great influence in shaping Canada into the country it is today. There is a lot to unpack about his complex legacy. This

tour engages visitors in discussion around social class structures, racism, and sexism in Victorian Canada while looking closer at some of Macdonald's political decisions. Tours run between 60 and 90 minutes and are offered from May 20, through October, 1:00 p.m.

Get out with your friends this summer and experience all that is new at Bellevue House. There is something new for everyone, even those that have been in the past and a visit is a great way to learn a little more about Kingston and Canadian history. The Parks Canada team look forward to seeing you at our old house this summer, and introducing you to new experiences!

## Medal event in Hamilton

# Nothing special planned for Sir John A's birthday

The 156th anniversary of Sir John A. Macdonald's birth will go unobserved in Kingston next month despite the fact he is buried in Cataraqui Cemetery and represented Kingston for most of his political life.

But in Hamilton, all babies born on Jan. 11 will receive bronze medallions commemorating the birth of the nation's first prime minister.

Hamilton is planning elaborate celebrations Jan. 10-11. The activities are being arranged by the Hamilton Progressive Conservative Association.

Lt.-Col. Louis J. Flynn said

the Kingston Historical Society has taken over, effective 1971, the annual memorial service marking his death on June 6 at Macdonald's grave in Cataraqui Cemetery.

Previously, the service was arranged by the Progressive Conservative Association for Kingston and The Islands.

Attempts have been made in recent years to have more school children participate in the graveside testimonial.

"We were asked by the PCs if we'd take over the memorial service in June and we agreed," Col. Flynn said. Detailed arrangements for the service will be made several weeks before the June 6 event.

Major Edward Friel, curator at Bellevue House, Macdonald's short-term residence here, said no special plans have been formulated to mark the 156th anniversary.

He said the house, restored to its original state at a cost of \$150,000, will be open to the public between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. on that day.

"We've had not word that special groups intend to visit." Macdonald's home on that date (Jan. 11), but we'll certainly welcome anyone who does pay us a visit."

Col. Flynn expressed the hope that Kingston Jaycees would choose Jan. 11 as the date for their annual "Citizen of the Year" award.

The event is generally held in January, but on no specific date.

Murney Tower

To Open

One of Kingston's historical sites will again be on display for the summer when the Murney Redoubt tower is opened to the public this Saturday.

Located in Macdonald Park, the tower was constructed in 1846 for the defence of the city against the possibility of invasion. At that time was seemed possible between Great Britain and the U.S. over an Oregon boundary dispute.

The tower is owned by the department of northern affairs and leased for a dollar a year to the Kingston Historical Society.

A nominal admission fee is charged by the society.

For the opening ceremony, at 3:30 this Saturday, a tea will be served to members of the society. Visitors will also be admitted.

The tower is annually open for the months of July and August. Last year visitors to the site numbered over 3,000



### Speaker's Corner

## The World's Oldest Profession Comes to Kingston

Kingston's storied history has traditionally been cast in Whiggish terms with tales of nation-building, lime-stone architecture, learned communities and military vigilance. It therefore came as somewhat of a surprise when our April speaker, Queen's doctoral candidate Margaret Ross, applied startling terms such as "tenderloin district," "madame" and "vagrant prostitute" to the local canvas. Maggie is completing a doctoral thesis on what is now called the "sex trade" in late nineteenth and early twentieth century Kingston.

In the nineteenth century, Kingston's large military and waterfront population stimulated vibrant brothels with well-known brands such as the Iron Clad on Johnson Street and Spencer's Grove in the North End. These, Maggie told us, were "successful businesses" generating steady earnings for the madames who ran them, the landlords who rented out the premises and taxi drivers who conveyed the clients. Ross's interest in local prostitution is, however, not so much in its detail, but more in the communal reaction to and coping strategies for local brothels. How did Kingston tolerate or attempt to regulate a trade in human desire that was proscribed by the 1892 criminal code as illegal? To find this, Ross gained access to Kingston's police court records for the years 1880-1920 and meticulously mined them to highlight the fines and sentencing judgements meted out to local prostitutes in those years.

Ross' research reached many revealing conclusions. Her abiding ambition was to treat those active in the trade in terms of their own dignity as humans forced by socio-economic circumstances into precarious and often dangerous lives. In the nineteenth century, the touch of moral regulation was overt and regular but generally ineffectual with brothel owners and prostitutes habitually cycling through the justice system. As Kingston urbanized and the military departed in the twentieth century, prostitution became more tolerated and lightly-regulated by the City with hands-on supervision of the trade provided by quasi-state agencies such as the Childrens' Aid Society. War in 1914 brought a toughening of attitude to the sex trade in a city now faced with growing wartime debt and the sanctimonious pressure of patriotism. When an alderman complained that prostitution was turning the city "rotten" the local police and the military began raiding brothels, thereby reaping in fines for city coffers and keeping the soldier boys dedicated to their military duty.

Ross concluded her talk by outlining her volunteer work in support of local sex workers today, women she feels deserve the dignity of a legitimate trade and the safety, rather than the prosecution, of society. (See: SWAG – Sex Workers Action Group Kingston.) Maggie has recently reported her research in the Journal of the History of Sexuality.
