Murney Fest 2025



Hey Murney Friends! At the beginning of our operating season, I began exploring the vast number of artifacts in the Murney Tower Museum collection when I stumbled upon two interesting paintings. These mysterious and richly coloured portraits had me wondering who these figures were and what their connection to Kingston and Murney Tower Museum was. All I knew were their names, Naomi Grant Macpherson and David Macpherson. Intense research and investigation into our archives revealed that while this couple lived their entire lives in Scotland, their children made quite the careers for themselves in Kingston. They became deeply entwined in merchantry, business, and politics, and married well too! Now their parents are immortilized in the city that brought them success, honouring and continuing the Macpherson family legacy.
